#### ADMISSION—PARKING

The admission charge will be 50c per person. Cars and buses will be parked FREE, near the exhibit area.

#### **BANQUET**

#### DISPLAY OF TROPHIES

Trophies will be on display the week previous to the Match in one of the stores in Cobourg.

#### **ELECTRICITY**

The Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario has made provision to supply electric power to the "Tented City". Service will be 115/230 volts, 60 cycle. Exhibitors and caterers are required to make their own arrangements with local electricians for wiring of space, and sufficient wire should be provided to reach from tent to the nearest hydro pole. A fused switch must be provided to control the total load, and wiring must be in accordance with requirements of Electrical Inspection Department. Charges for duration of Match will be \$1.00 inspection fee, plus 25 cents per 100 watts of connected load. Information may be obtained by applying to N. E. #### FIRE PROTECTION

The Ontario Fire Marshal's Department will be represented at the Match. Their inspectors will check on fire hazards, and equipment will be on hand to take care of emergencies. Fire Fighting Demonstrations will be held daily in the demonstration ring.

#### GAMBLING AND RAFFLES

No person shall be permitted to carry on any kind of gambling, raffle, or game of chance in the "Tented City", parking fields, roads or other area under control of the Ontario Plowmen's Association, during the period of the International Plowing Match.


It is a pleasure for me to extend to your association and all visitors to the International Plowing Match in 1953 a very hearty welcome to the Port Hope area.



#### RULES AND REGULATIONS - 1953 (Except for Ontario, Canadian and World Championship Classes)

(a) Competition will be open to all plowmen, but a resident of Ontario must have won a 1st or 2nd prize at a match conducted by a Branch of the Ontario Plowmen's Association. Competitors will be required to state on entry form when they last qualified.

(b) This qualifying rule DOES NOT APPLY to contestants in Classes 3 to 13 inclusive on October 6th, open to residents of the Counties of Ontario, Peterborough, Victoria, Hastings, Prince Edward, Lennox and Addington, Durham and Northumberland, or to those chosen as team members to represent a Secondary School or a County in classes 29 and 40 respectively.

Plowmen in local Counties, already qualified under Section (a) and those winning a 1st or 2nd prize in Classes 3 to 13 inclusive will be eligible to compete on the other three days of the Match.

2. Entries will be received at Headquarters Office "Tented City" on Opening Day, October 6th, up to 9.00 a.m., but in case of Class No. 1 (Ontario Championship), entry along with fee of \$5.00, should be forwarded to F. A. Lashley, Ontario Plowmen's Association, Parliament Buildings, Toronto, Ont., by SEPTEMBER 15th. Positively no entry in this Class AFTER the above date.

Entries in Classes scheduled for October 7th, 8th and 9th, unless otherwise specified, will be accepted at Head-quarters Office up to 5.30 p.m., on the day previous to competition.

Entry limited to ONE Class EACH day.

- 3. Entry fee of \$1.00 will be charged in all Classes, except Class 1, (see rule No. 2).
- 4. Competitors within a 50 mile radius of the Match will be required to furnish their own TEAMS and TRACTORS. Those beyond 50 miles, who make application for a team or tractor, will be supplied at a charge of \$5.00 each, for the duration of the Match. Application must be made in writing to R. C. Banbury, Dept. of Agriculture, Brighton, Ontario, by SEPTEMBER 25th. Tractor applications should indicate the make, and the days on which required. Tractors provided for late applicants will be assigned by draw. Competitors are expected to supply their own PLOWS.
- 5. Lands will be allotted by draw ballot. Each competitor in TRACTOR classes will receive his ticket, bearing land number, at the Tractor Park between 8.30 a.m. and 9.30 a.m. For HORSE classes, competitors will receive their land tickets at the Field, from the Steward in charge.
- 6. Competitors must be ready to commence plowing by 10.00 a.m. each day.
- 7. Lands Committee reserves the right to provide either sod or stubble, for competitors, as circumstances permit.
- 8. Any competitor who fails to co-operate in the policy or procedure employed by the Local Committee in assigning teams or tractors, shall not be entitled to receive prize money, and may be debarred from competition.

- after FIRST ROUND, on coulter or share of any plow. Scratches will not be permitted in tractor classes, except single furrow.
- 10. No special attachment will be permitted on any plow.
- 11. After setting and removing stakes, NO ASSISTANT or COACH WILL BE ALLOWED on the contestant's land, in any class.
- 12. No shaping of furrows by hand, foot, plow stake, or otherwise, will be allowed, except by foot when the plow is in motion, and for scratches, first two rounds, last green round and sole furrow.
- 13. Lot number stake, as placed by Committee, shall be the centre of crown.
- 14. The CROWN, when a single furrow plow is used, shall consist of three rounds or six heavy furrows, after which contestant shall gather twelve additional furrows and then commence to cast off. When lands are too narrow to permit the application of this definition, same may be modified by the Steward in charge of the class.
- 15. The last three rounds and sole furrow shall constitute the FINISH. This rule may be modified by the Steward in charge, if deemed necessary.
- 16. The complete land will be judged, and the only consideration given a competitor will be where his neighbour's plowing is crooked, or otherwise below standard.
- 17. In the opinion of the judge, if the work of any competitor does not reach a minimum standard, a prize may be reduced or withheld.
- 18. Finishing time will be fixed and announced by Steward in charge of each class. Where contestant has to make an extra scratch, fifteen minutes will be allowed and he will be required to plow same width as other competitors.
- 19. A jointer plow is one with a share measuring not less than 8 inches, and with a breast measuring not less than 6½ inches. (Measure 6½ inches from the land side of plow to outside of bottom of mouldboard, from directly under the point wnere the top corner of the mouldboard touches the beam.) Furrows shall not be less than 9 inches in width, excepting in the CROWN and FINISH.
- 20. Average depth of furrows shall be not less than 6 inches, unless otherwise specified by the Board of Directors. ALL FURROWS MUST START AND FINISH AT SCRATCH.
- 21. In 10 inch tractor classes the plow must be set at 10 inches and the share measure not less than 7½ inches. In the 12 inch classes the plow must be set at 12 inches and the share measure not less than 9 inches.
- 22. In tractor classes plows must be left INTACT until lands are completed.
- 23. A contestant who has won a championship in horse plow classes cannot compete in other than open classes with a tractor, or vice versa.
- 24. The decision of the judges will be final.
- 25. "International Plowing Match" shall mean a match conducted by the Ontario Plowmen's Association.
- 26. The Association will not be responsible for prizes un-



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
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#### **FOREWORD**

In the past, "International Matches" have been announced by different Plowing Associations and competitors have entered from several countries. It has been agreed that usually these plowmen have been at a disadvantage as they were obliged to plow to standards and under rules prevailing in those countries and in the formation of which they did not have a voice. This restricted the exchange of plowmen between countries.

In the hope of providing a means of encouraging much wider international competition, there was an exchange of correspondence between interested persons of different countries over several years. Later, three international conferences were held and finally, at the last of these at Falkirk, Scotland, in November 1952, the World Championship Plowing Organization was formed and a governing board was elected.

#### PRINCIPAL OBJECTIVES

- 1. To provide a vehicle for international competition in the art of match plowing on an equitable basis.
- 2. To raise the standards of plowing, soil cultivation and soil conservation in all participating countries.
- 3. By encouraging these better methods to increase the world production of food.
- 4. To encourage pride in recognized farm skills.
- 5. To promote the prestige of agriculture in all countries.
- 6. To make a substantial contribution to international understanding and goodwill among the citizens of many nations.

#### RULES FOR WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP CLASS

1. COMPETITORS. Competition is open to all countries of the world. Each country may enter two competitors only, who must be the officially acknowledged Championship Plowmen of that country and of which they must be national citizens. There is no age limit.

The Competitors must be entered in the Contest by the acknowledged authority representing plowing interests in each respective country and such body must satisfy the International Governing Board that it is properly represented.

- 2. TYPE OF PLOWING. The World Class will be limited to tractor plowing until further notice.
- 3. TYPE OF PLOW. The contest is limited to mounted or trailer semi-digger two-furrow plows fitted with skimmers, but no other extraneous attachments such as fins, knives, boats, seamers, press wheels or weights may be used other than a standard tailpiece.
- 4. TYPE OF LAND. Each competitor will be required to plow one plot of grassland and one plot of stubble land.
- 5. SIZE OF PLOTS. Each plot will measure approximately ½ acre (English) or about 2,000 sq. yards.
- 6. TIME ALLOWED for plowing of each plot will be 3 hours.
- 7. JUDGES. There will be one judge appointed from each country taking part in the Contest. Judges must satisfy the Governing Board that they have been specially instructed in these International Rules.
- 8. SUPERVISION. These Rules will be strictly enforced and Competitors will be required to abide by them under the supervision of special Stewards who will wear white coats and identity badges in order to be easily recognized.
- 9. FURROW SIZE. The width of furrow is at the Competitor's discretion, but the depth must be not less than 5 inches and may be from 5 inches to 7 inches according to the type of land. Skimmers must be used. No cut allowed after first round on the coulter or share of any plow.
- 10. GRASSLAND PLOWING. In plowing grassland the Competitor may use his own discretion as to what method he chooses to make the opening. He may make a "gather" or draw a split.
- 11. STUBBLE PLOWING. In Stubble plowing, Competitors must make an opening scratch at the "setting out". The strip must be well cut through so that no land is left unturned in the middle of the ridge. First a split scratch

- shall be made in which the rippling is turned out, then in the reverse direction the scratch shall be gathered to the centre, thus ensuring all the land having been cut. After this, plowing begins and no handling is permitted.
- 12. SIGHTING AND SETTING OUT. Three sighting poles only may be used. The use of a guide line, footmarks, stones, sods or anything else instead of, or additional to the three permitted poles is forbidden. The plot number stake, as placed by the Board, indicates the centre of the crown. The help of a second person in placing and removing sighting poles is the only assistance permitted to any Competitor.
- 13. NO ASSISTANCE ALLOWED. After completion of "setting out" no person other than the Competitor, Judges and Officials authorized by the Governing Board will be allowed on any plot.
- 14. FURROWS. No shaping of furrows by hand, hand held instrument or by treading, or other manipulation will be allowed, excepting for scratches only, which may be handled, but not removed. The "finish" comprises the last three rounds and the sole furrow.
- 15. METHOD. After completing the crown, Competitors must plow two heavy furrows six times about and then commence to throw out. This means that there will be twelve heavy furrows gathered on each side of the crown.
- 16. INFRINGEMENT. A competitor breaking any of these Rules shall receive only one warning and automatically forfeit 5 points. Upon a second infringement the Competitor will be disqualified by the Judges and Governing Board.
- 17. STARTING AND FINISHING TIMES. A green warning aerial signal will be fired at 11.25 a.m., and 5 minutes later at 11.30 a.m. a red signal will be fired indicating the moment of the start of the Contest. Three hours later at 2.25 p.m. a green warning signal will be fired, followed five minutes later at 2.30 p.m. by a red signal, from which moment the Contest is ended, when all plowing must cease.
- 18. PERIOD OF CONTEST. The Board will arrange for the grassland and stubble plowing to take place on either one day or on two successive days, according to organizing convenience.

*Note*: Only one tractor wheelmark allowed for on the castoff which shall be made in the normal course of plowing. Any wheelmark other than this shall be considered manipulation of the furrow, as in Rule 4, and the Competitor will be disqualified.

#### JUDGES' METHOD OF SCORING

	Maximum Points
CROWN, otherwise known as ridge, middle or opening. (Opening furrow shall be straight and uniform throughout)	
BURYING of grass or stubble. (Skimmers must be used and all grass and weed growth must be buried out of sight beneath the sod)	
FIRMNESS or Packing. (The furrow must feel firm under the foot and there must be a minimum of crumbling of the furrow wall. Furrows must be laid neatly packed together and have no gaps through which grain might be lost under the sod)	
SEED BED (i.e. Soil made available). (The upturned sod must present enough soil to quickly produce a good deep tilth when subsequent cultivations are applied)	
APPEARANCE (includes straightness and uniformity of the furrow and the ins and outs, or land ends, must be in a straight line even with the end stakes)	15
FINISH, or furrow. (Comprising the last three rounds and the sole furrow. The Finish shall be	10


