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

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
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LETTERS FROM THE CLERGY


I am pleased to have the opportunity of commenting upon our Church Hockey League in Cobourg and of endorsing its Young Canada Night on Feb. 18th. I do so not only as the minister of one of the participating churches but also as a parent whose son has derived benefit from this program.

In his letters, St. Paul never hesitated to use metaphors taken from the athletic contest to drive home his point about the strenuousness of the Christian life. Boxing, wrestling, track and field were all well known to this spiritual athlete. If our sons in all the churches may learn from their participation in the weekly games the necessity for striving and working at their faith, much that is of lasting value has been achieved.

Further, Christianity is not given to dividing a man's make up into separate compartments. It chooses rather to regard man's total personality and its message of salvation and redemption is addressed to the entire person. While there is no undue emphasis upon physical cluture to the desparagement of the mind and spirit, neither does our faith speak desprisingly of the body. Rather we are urged to clean living by the fact 'Your bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit'. Health and 'wholeness' in the Biblical sense are derived from a common root. I feel sure that our church HOCKEY League makes a significant contribution to the health and physical development of our sons. The fact that it is CHURCH hockey should lead us to see that the end of this development is not the production of super men nor even professional athletes but the promotion of the glory of God in our sons.



The Cobourg Church Hockey League is one of the most important organizations in our community. It provides Canada's winter past-time for 375 boys from six to sixteen among 24 teams in four age divisions. It embraces the villages of Grafton and Baltimore. It is an outing for many youngsters from the Ontario Training Schools for Boys.

Tonight is Young Canada Night-the crowning glory for Church Leaguers, particularly the cream of the crop who will be participating before a jampacked house. But tonight is of two fold significance. Not only is it the big night of the year for the league but it is the celebration of a quarter century of service to the community. Thus, Cobourg can be doubly pround of the league's efforts this evening, of its optimistic future and of its 25-year history.

Those associated with the game anticipate that Young Canada Night will focus attention on Church League hockey with its many facets, in many ways. They hope to publicize the night and the game, so that every man, woman and child, in Cobourg, will have a new awareness of the game, its characteristics, potentialities, possibilities and advantages; to impress upon parents the work being done for their boys and to encourage them to support the coaches, managers, helpers, executive and referees; to raise funds so that Church League can carry on its vital program; and to encourage parents to become actively interested in the operation of the various teams.

They hope that this one night will draw attenion to the values of the game - citizenship, sportsmanship, character-building, respect for authority and respect for the property of others; plus the physical, mental, moral and social aspects.

Church League is the foundation upon which future teams can be built. It costs money to run such a league and every parent and hockey fan should get behind the league and encourage the young players with their applause as well as their money.

These outstanding citizens hope to impress upon everyone that the game also has bodybuilding advantages, not only because of the fact that through it we have lads taking part in active exercise, but because the boys are taught that if they wish to become good hockey players, they must keep in shape, train, eat properly, keep proper hours and keep up their school work; in general to live a clean Christain life and to act as gentlemen. These requisities will stamp him as truly a good citizen, a good Canadian, a credit to his parents, his municipality and above all, Canada.

All of these little things add up to the important total of better boys and a better community. To keep one lad out of trouble is worth all the effort of all the coaches of all the leagues in Canada. All in all, Church League Hockey is a powerful antidote for that poison referred to as "juvenile delinquency." REMEMBER, keep a boy on ice and you'll keep him out of hot water.



The league was swelled to 24 teams with the additions of Baltimore Pee Wees, St. Mikes B's Mites, St. Mikes B's and Trinity B's in the Pee Wee series. Vince Massey moved that a program be printed to commemorate the 25th year of Church League Hockey and be distributed Young Canada Night.

What future awaits the CCHL? Young Canada Night appears headed for a new record in popularity. Here's hoping the Night next 25 years of Church League will be successful as the quarter of a century.




- 1. I will not smoke.






