Umpires Clinic Held On May 29th



Seventeen people, umpires and players, attended the Umpires Clinic, held at Our Lady of Mercy School, last Saturday, to receive instruction from some of the top Umpires in Zone 7 of the Softball Association. Present were: Jim Bradford, Umpirein-Chief for Zone 7, Baltimore, Ont., Assistant Instructor Don McFadden, Trenton, and Brian McIntosh of Cold Springs, an Assistant Umpire for Zone 7.

For much of the day, the umpires divided the people attending the clinic into three groups, so that small classes could be taught.

The day ended with about an hour's practice on Our Lady of Mercy School's ball field in making umpire's calls for softball.

Rule Changes

There are a few changes in softball rules, for the 1982 season. These have been adopted by the International

Softball Federation Playing Rules Committee, and will be used by all participants in the Ontario Softball Association. Three rules are especially important, are explained here:


Rule 1-14 (new). Add Offensive Conference:

The offensive team requests a suspension of play to allow the manager or other team representatives to confer with the batter or baserunner.

Rule 6-lb. Change to read:

Preliminary to pitching, the pitcher must bring his WHOLE body to a full and complete stop facing the batter with his/her shoulders in line with first and third base and with the ball held in both hands in front of the body. This full and complete stop position must be maintained for a minimum of one second and not more than ten (10) seconds before starting the pitch.

important rule change this year. It is now imperative that coaches and managers report all and any substitution to the plate umpire.

Woody McNevin is in charge of umpires again this year. No official softball game can begin without an umpire being present.

Jim Bradford: One of Canada's most qualified softball umpires

One of the country's most competent softball umpires lives right here in this area. He's Jim Bradford, 37, of Baltimore.

Bradford, achieved Level 5 status late last year, putting him in an elite class of 18 arbiters in Canada with the highest possible credentials. That means he's eligible to officiate internationally.

Being selected to work a Canadian senior men's National and to get a crack at attaining his Level 5 had been Jim's goals until last summer when his dream came true. He was assigned to umpire in the Canadians at Fredericton, New Brunswick. He responded to the challenge superbly.

Since receiving confirmation last November of his being upgraded to Level 5, Bradford has been picked by Softball Canada as the alternate official for the World Youth Games in Fargo, North Dakota, in July of this year.

He's already instructed at an Eastern Canadian softball clinic in Saint John, New Brunswick, back in February and at an Ontario provincial clinic early in March. In the same month, he was named the new Slow Pitch umpire-in-chief of Ontario. He was in London in that capacity for a seminar just this past weekend.

Bradford still has a goal to strive for — the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul, Korea — if softball is included as a sport there.

Jim's love for officiating keeps him busy the year round. He referees basketball and hockey during the cold weather months.

Bradford first began to umpire back in 1968 in local baseball tournaments after an active and athletic youth in softball, baseball, hockey, skiing, football, volleyball, crosscountry and basketball.


Bradford is a teacher by profession, currently in a K-6 setting at Dr. Powers School in Port Hope. Besides all the officiating he does, Jim somehow finds time to play golf and slow pitch ball, ski, convene Ontario

Jerry Lawless, physical education head at Cobourg's West Collegiate, inspired Bradford's basketball officiating career by driving him to his first clinic 35 miles away. Jim got hooked on basketball from that initial exposure to it. In the next few years he helped set up the United Counties Baskeball Officials organization. Now, he is president of the Cobourg Board of Approved Basketball Officials as well as a carded IAABO and FIBA official.

Five years ago, along with four other men, Bradford spearheaded the formation of the South Central Umpires Association. It unites about 30 arbiters and supplies umpires for the majority of softball and slow pitch leagues in the district.

Bradford became more heavily involved with softball in 1980 while officiating basketball in the Ontario Summer Games at Peterborough. There, he met Sharon Sinclair, provincial umpire-in-chief, whom he credits as having had the greatest influence on his officiating career.

Shortly thereafter, he was asked to join the Softball Ontario program as a zone umpire-in-chief. Since 1980, Jim has called balls and strikes, safes

REMEMBERING JIM BRADFORD

On July 20th, 2001 softball regretfully lost a skilful umpire named Jim Bradford.

Softball Canada along with the countless other softball friends that had the fortune of working alongside Jim wish to pass our condolences onto his wife Keren and their two children Jeanette and Scott.

Last year Jim achieved a Level V in SP, thus becoming the first official in the world to receive his Level V status in both softball games.

The Officiating Development Committee requested of Jim that he write us an article to highlight his remarkable achievement.

Below is Jim's article about his most memorable moments as a softball official.

JIM BRADFORD BALTIMORE, ONTARIO

FIRST TO ACHIEVE DUAL LEVEL V FP/SP

I have been and continue to be happily married and have been for 32 years. I have officiated the same length of time. My wife Keren has been very patient in allowing me to pursue my umpiring whenever and wherever I wanted to go.

Over the course of those years I have held positions of

Deputy Zone UIC, Zone UIC, Deputy SP Provincial UIC and

served nationally on the ODC as a Deputy with my focus divided between SP and FP.

Over the years, I have worked on the committee preparing the exams, written articles for the local, provincial, national periodicals and have been published in Referee. At the Ontario training session weekend, I have been a presenter and also at the Blue Convention in Toronto and in Fredericton.

In my tenure with Softball Canada, I had the privilege of helping develop the level programs (manuals) and supervised at Canadian Championships, both FP and SP, a total of 15 to date.

I attained my Level V FP in Fredericton in 1984 at the Senior Men's. It was a wonderful experience! In 2000 in London, Ontario I was pleased to be chosen to work the Canadian SP Championships and was granted my Level V SP. What a thrill! It was like working my very first tournament in terms of the excitement, except that after 30 years of umpiring, I had a few more skills to bring to the game.

I have worked the following Canadian Championships: Midget Boys FP in Napanee, Ontario in 1982, Senior Men's FP in Fredericton, NB in 1984, Senior Men's FP in Waterloo,

Ontario in 1985 (as a fill in from Friday through Sunday), Senior Men's FP in Waterloo, Ontario in 1996, and Senior Men's SP in London, Ontario in 2000.

In 1987, I was happy to accept the assignment to the Pan Am Games in Indianapolis, Indiana as one of two Canadian umpires. It was unbelievable!

In 1994, I was one of many Canadian umpires to have the opportunity to work in St. John's, Newfoundland at the Women's World Championships.

The funniest thing I ever saw (heard) in softball was during one of my Canadians, I was at first base in the Saturday night tussle between the two teams who were battling to decide who would go to the final. The plate umpire called "strike four"! The first baseman turned to his bench which was on the first base line and he asked the bench, "Did he say, "strike four"? The bench responded in the affirmative. He and his teammates broke up and it was all I could do to keep a straight face.

The highlights of my umpiring career revolve around handling pressure cooker games where teams or individuals bring out the worst in one another. That is the ultimate challenge to me and I pride myself in handling those situations in a professional, firm, matter of fact manner.

I guess that's it for now.



Renowned softball umpire to be inducted into hall of fame

Special To The Star

A retired elementary school teacher from Baltimore will be inducted, posthumously, into Softball Canada's Hall of Fame later this year.

Jim Bradford, who died tragically and suddenly on July 20, 2001 at the age of 52, was this area's finest and most accredited softball umpire and a highly certified basketball referee at the time of his death.

His widow, Keren, will fly to Winnipeg, MB, to accept the honour officially on behalf of her late husband at a special ceremony Nov. 8.

To this day, Bradford remains the

only umpire in the entire country to have achieved elite Level 5 status in both fast-pitch and slo-pitch softball.

In recognition of his contribution to softball and basketball over a period exceeding two decades, eight awards/events have been named in his memory.

As proof of the esteem in which he was held as an arbiter, Bradford worked the Pan Am Games in Indianapolis, the Canadian senior men's fast-pitch championships in Fredericton, N.B., the national midget boys' fastball championships in Napanee, and the women's worlds in Newfoundland, to mention a

few, along with numerous provincial tournaments. He also acted as the umpire supervisor in various national competitions.

Locally, Bradford was the product of the Cobourg Legion Minor Softball Association All-Star chain; played the infield for the two-time Ontario Intermediate 'C' championship Cold Springs Cats in the 1970s; and for the Cobourg Intermediates, before taking up umpiring on a full-time basis.

He founded the South Central Umpires Association and served for many years as vice-president of the Cobourg Men's Softball League.



Umpire Jim Bradford achieves his ambition Officiates at Pan American Games

Jim Bradford has been back from the Pan American Games for almost two weeks, yet he's still on a high following his experiences there as a softball official.


"You don't get a chance to go to the Pan Am's every year," said Bradford of the quadrennial event. "It is something that I've worked for since 1980 when I realized that my dream (of going to an international tournament) was possible."

In order to fulfill his dream, Bradford's first task was to acquire Softball Canada's Level V umpire certification, a plateau he reached in 1984. The ensuing years have been devoted to working important tournaments and attending training women's games, both at the plate and on the bases. "I wanted to do well and I did what I could to prepare myself," said the Baltimore resident. "I was satisfied with what I did. I umpired as best as I ever did."

Canada's entries fared well in the softball competition, with the men's team capturing the gold and the women settling for the bronze.

"The women deserved a better fate," said Bradford. "They out-hit Puerto Rico (in the bronze medal game) by an 8-1 margin, yet they still lost 1-0." The only Puerto Rican hit was a triple which scored a runner who had reached base by way of a walk.

Although the men won, the team did not necessarily contain the best that Canada has to offer.



sessions so as to ready himself both physically and mentally for an event as significant as the Pan Am Games.

Canada sent two softball teams to the Games in Indianapolis, which permitted Softball Canada to select two representatives to serve as officials. There are approximately 20 active Level V umpires in Canada, and from this group Bradford, a 19-year veteran, and Guy Arseneault of Trois Rivieres were chosen.

The thrill did not stop with being selected to officiate. Recalling the Games' opening ceremonies, Bradford explained that "you can't put into words the emotions and feelings that come to you."

Not all of the countries participating in the Games are amongst softball's reigning superpowers, but Bradford felt that "the good teams were way above what we see here locally." Among the men's teams he included Canada, the United States and Cuba as the strongest, while Canada, the U.S. and Puerto Rico were a step ahead of the others in the women's competition.

Working in a four umpires per-game system, Bradford officiated at four men's and ten The International Softball Congress tournament coincided with the Pan Am's, and a number of Canada's best had commitments to the ISC tournament.

One of the standout individual performances that Bradford witnessed was that of American pitcher Michele Granger. The 17 year old phenom led the U.S. women's team to the gold medal, recording 61 strikeouts in 28 innings, with a 0.00 earned run average. "She could stand most men's teams on their ear," said Bradford.

For now it is business as usual for the elementary school teacher, who will be handling a grade five class at Dr. Powers Public School when classes resume next week. The taste of international competition has only whetted his appetite for more, though. Bradford is anticipating that softball will be included as an Olympic event, possibly as early as 1992 in Barcelona, Spain.

"For people who work hard and want to progress," says Bradford, "the possibilities are there; not necessarily as an athlete, but there are other avenues which can get you to international competition."





Area to be represented in Canadian Sr. tourney

The Cobourg district will be well represented in the 1984 Canadian Senior Men's Fastball Championships beginning later this month in the Maritimes.

Three players, all with national experience, and a local umpire will take part in the week-long national tournament to be held at Fredericton, New Brunswick from August 28 to September 2.

They are catcher Bill Elliott, leftfielder Mike McIvor and first baseman Allan Burnham. all of whom cavort for the Ontario champion Oshawa Merchants, and arbiter Jim Bradford of Baltimore.

For the three Cobourg players, this will be their second appearance in the Canadians. They were members of the Cold Springs Cats which represented the province so superbly at the Nationals in Saskatoon in 1980.

All three men played key roles in Oshawa Merchants capturing the top honors in the Ontario senior men's elimination tournament at Agincourt over the Civic Holiday weekend.

Elliott, for instance, had to catch eight games in a row after the other Oshawa receiver, with whom he generally shares assignments, sustained a broken kneecap early in the tournament.

McIvor, noted for his slugging prowess, enjoyed a good tournament at the Provincials, finishing with better than a .300

As for Burnham, he was the real batting star for Oshawa in the gruelling last day of the tournament. In one of the final games, Burnh m drove in four of Oshawa's five runs, highlighted by a three-run homer.
