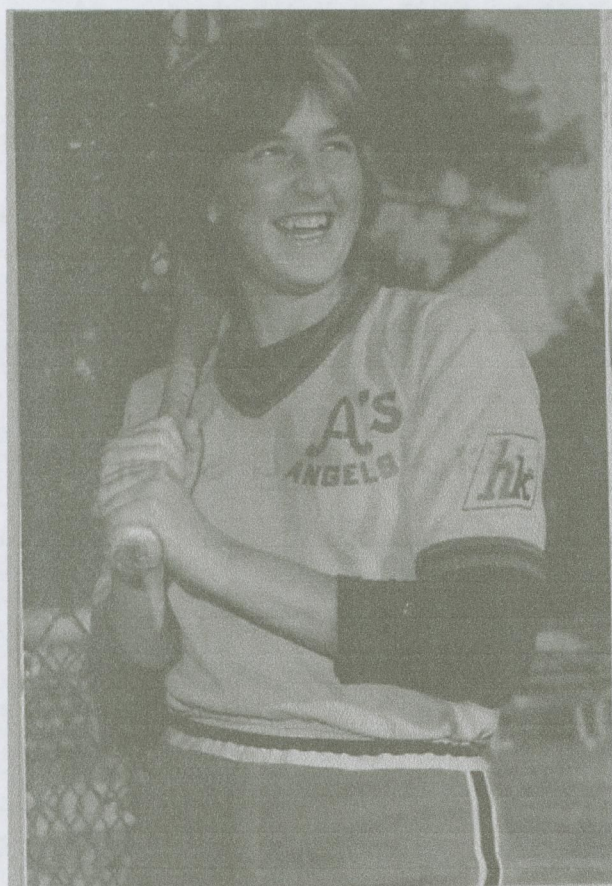

Ross Quigley, the man who dedicated an enormous amount of time and effort to establish the Cobourg and District Sports Hall of Fame was "Mr. Everything" to our community. Ross was a good student but not exceptional. He loved sports. He excelled at hockey, baseball, and golf. To say he was active in the community, is an understatement. When I think about Ross and his vision for the CDSHF, I think of Jennifer Ashley and her involvement in sports. Almost like a female version of Ross and his ideals. Much like Ross, Jennifer loved sports – playing coaching, watching and encouraging. Jennifer was asked by the Hall of Fame committee to join the Cobourg and District Sports Hall of Fame during its inception. The committee knew that she would be a valuable resource and ready to do anything, any time, for the CDSHF. She would make sure that women would be well represented in the Hall. Gender equality was important to keep the playing field balanced for both Ross and Jennifer.

She has impacted a number of people over the years – for the love of sport. Jennifer Ashley is the most well rounded person I have ever met! She knows almost every person in Cobourg, definitely an overstatement of facts, but she can't go anywhere without being recognized, just like Ross. She was valedictorian from CDCI West in '82. She played on almost every sports team for girls she graduated from the University of Toronto with a Physical Education and Teaching degree. She played forward on the Varsity hockey team for 5 years at the University of Toronto. They won the OUAA's (provincial championship 4 out of the 5 years!)

She certainly wasn't a 9-5:00 teacher. Often you would see Jennifer arriving home late after a tournament and loving every minute. She would take time out of her busy schedule to make sure her teams were always well prepared. She inspired students by example. Jennifer coached many sports and her teams loved her approach. She encouraged students to become the best that they could. Her students saw firsthand what she did. Humble by



nature, she never boasted or sought fame. Jennifer was kind and giving, and a role model to her students, both academically and athletically.

I have played in a number of baseball tournaments with Jennifer. She is always the person cheering others on and applauding good plays by her teammates. She could handle the bat and glove with aplomb. She was/is a gifted athlete. The type of person who could be introduced to a new sport and excel at it in a short period of time. I recall her coming out to play pickleball with and against me. I had been at it a while and considered myself a decent player. Along come Jennifer and she looked as though she had been playing for a couple of years. Confident of her skills, she held her own and didn't look out of place.

Her daughter shared with me that only a month ago she didn't know that her mother, Jennifer, was on the U of T Varsity rowing team!!

Many deserving individuals have not been selected by the Selection Committee because the application process can be laborious and time consuming, and individuals waited for others to do the legwork and submit an application. Jennifer has played a huge role in making sure athletes and builders were recognized by submitting a number of applications on their behalf.

Meet the Canadian Free Spirits, one of the most dominant softball teams in the world. And they're based here in Peterborough.

**The women's softball team are three-time gold medal winners at the World Master Games.**

The multi-sport event takes place every four years and features teams from across the world. Athletes compete in competitive and recreational brackets in age groups of 35 years and older, and 45 years and older.

The Canadian Free Spirits compete in the ladies' 45+ competitive softball division. They are led by head coach Elaine Devlin, who was a player when the Free Spirits won their first gold at the 2009 games in Sydney, Australia. Following those games, she turned to coaching and organizing the squad, which went on to win gold at the 2013 games in Turin, Italy, and again this year in Auckland, New Zealand.

## ATHLETICS

### BASEBALL: THE EARLY YEARS (Patsy Currelly Hand)

I think Jen is a great candidate, she has poured herself into minor sports as well as achieving a high level of athleticism! I believe she is one of the few from the original Angels that is still able to compete in fastball.

Jen started off playing in house league which was run by the YMCA. Each team were centered at the home parks. Jen was on the Creighton Heights team and played against other areas of Cobourg including Coverdale, Sinclair, Central and Donegan. From there Jen played on an All-Star team which was coached by Faye Oliver (Gaudet) and George Oliver and Sponsored the Cobourg Tony's Pizza which later became the Cobourg Oilers. This was the "normal route" that most of the young female ball or maybe even Cook School as I played against her).

\* Jen Played for Cobourg Tony's in 1977 and they won an Ontario Bantam B Championship.

\* In 1978 again playing for the Tony's they went to the finals and lost to Stratford again in Bantam.

\* They moved up to Midget in 1979 and again lost in the finals. In 1979, Jen would come up and play with the Angels for the odd game during league play (she played 9 games with the Juvenile Angels).

1979 would bring this Angel team their first All-Ontario Juvenile A Championship under the new PWSA system winning the 14 team regional play downs held in Cobourg and then the 9 team Ontario finals held in Rockwood. With a season of 50 wins and 7 losses, they were Lakeshore League champs. Members of the All- Ontario team were Marg Matthews, Suzanne Morrow, Sue Taylor, Bobbie Ann Hutchings, Nancy Sommerville, Leah Anne Goody, Vicki Etchells, Paul Currelly (coach), Jim Morrow (coach), Rod baker (business manager), and Janet Hynes (scorer 1979-1983)

Some of the Tony's players would also play on this team during the regular season, namely Jackie Dusenbury, **Jennifer Dalgarno**, and Jane Choiniere. By winning the Tier 11 championship, the team qualified to enter into the Senior Tier 1 Ontario Championships. Although they finished



6<sup>th</sup> overall, their presence was known, including an exhaustive 17 inning win (pitched by Devlin) against Agincourt. Harnden and King continued their 17<sup>th</sup> consecutive year as team sponsor. Members of the winning Ontario title were: Susan Taylor, Nancy Cronin, Margir matthews, Suzanne Morrow, Leah Anne Goody, Nancy Jane Dalgarno, Elaine Devlin (37-5 pitching record) Jackie Oulahen, Lee Anne Quinn, **Jennifer Dalgarno**, Isobel Nichols, Vicki Wodzack, and Patsy Currelly. Paul Currelly, Jim Morrow, and John Hayden were the coaches.

The Angels won multiple tournaments and were Ontario Champions in 1984 – Ontario Senior Tier II Champions; 1985 - Ontario Senior Tier II Champions; 1987 – Ontario Senior Tier II Champions and went onto the Finals in Tier I (the top three teams from Tier II competed in the Tier I division which was the A division – best fastball in Ontario). 1990 the Angels under the direction of Charlie Fraser won the Senior Tier I Ontario Championship.

# Angels play super softball to reclaim senior II title

Hamden & King Angels hadn't played as well in a couple of years.

That was the consensus of the coaches and the players in the wake of winning their third Provincial Women's Softball Association senior tier II championship in the past four years at Belleville July 17-18-19.

Angels left no doubt they deserved No. 1 status in the double knockout tournament by reeling off four consecutive victories on the strength of superlative pitching by wonderwoman Elaine Devlin, timely hitting and sound defence.

"The team went into the tournament with a positive attitude and stayed that way throughout it," noted coach Jim Morrow.

Cobourg began with a 14-1 lambasting of Burlington in a game halted after five innings on account of the mercy rule. They snatched a vital 2-1 triumph over Norwich Jets, came from behind to beat Sarnia Belles 4-2 and then rested while Sarnia endured the tiring elimination process to get another crack at Angels in the final. Belles were spent by then and Cobourg controlled the show to take the championship game 3-0.

It had to be gratifying for Angels since Sarnia Belles shut them out twice in a row in last year's Ontario tournament to end Angels' reign.

Devlin hurled magnificently for Angels in the '87 championships. Pitching all four games, she allowed only 16 hits, struck out 30 batters and walked just six. Devlin mixed up her pitches effectively. Catchers Barb Snedden and Patsy Currelly deserve a lot of the credit for that.

Devlin scattered seven safeties, permitting only one Sarnia runner to reach third base in the course of chalking up the shutout.

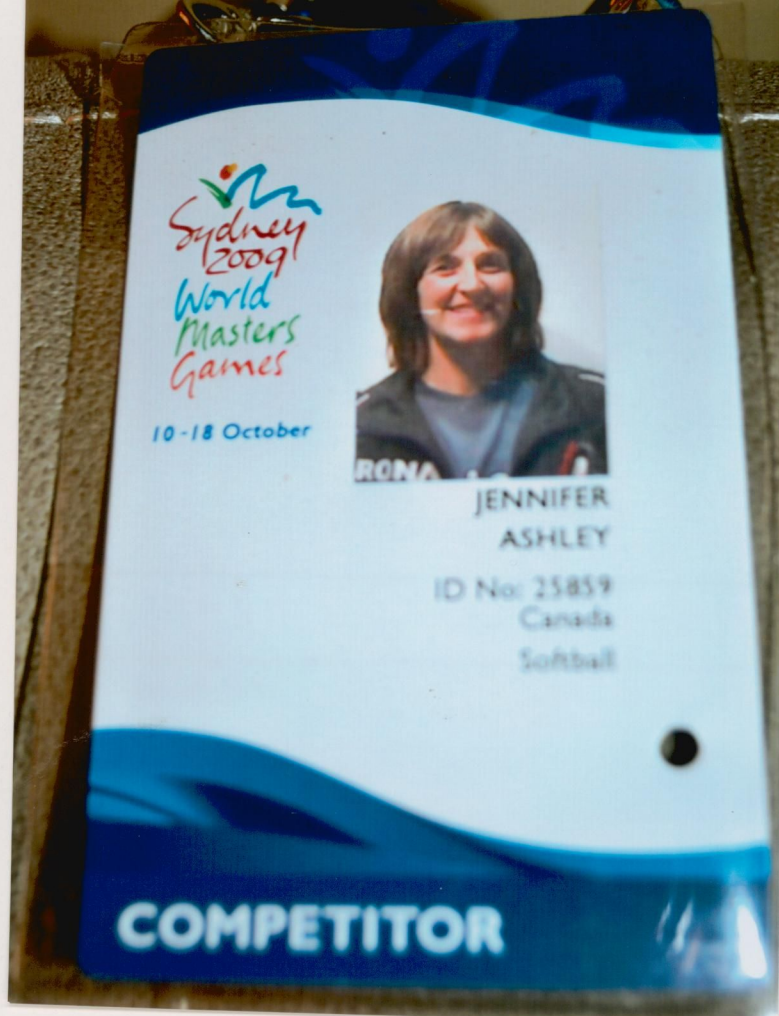

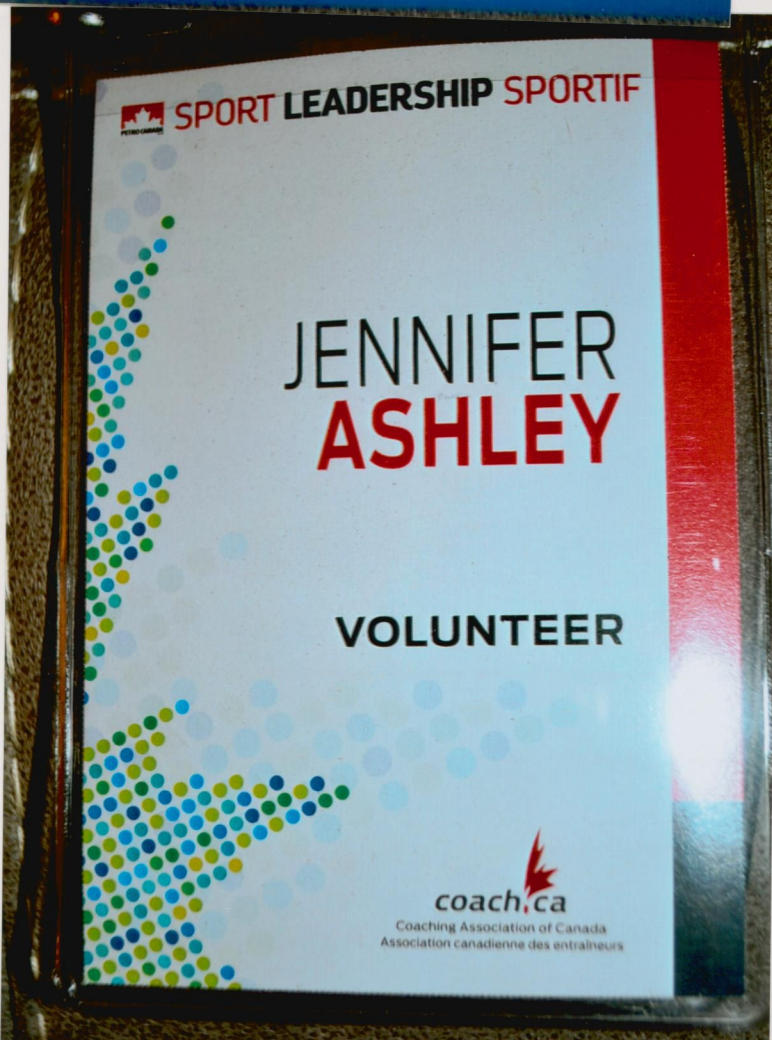
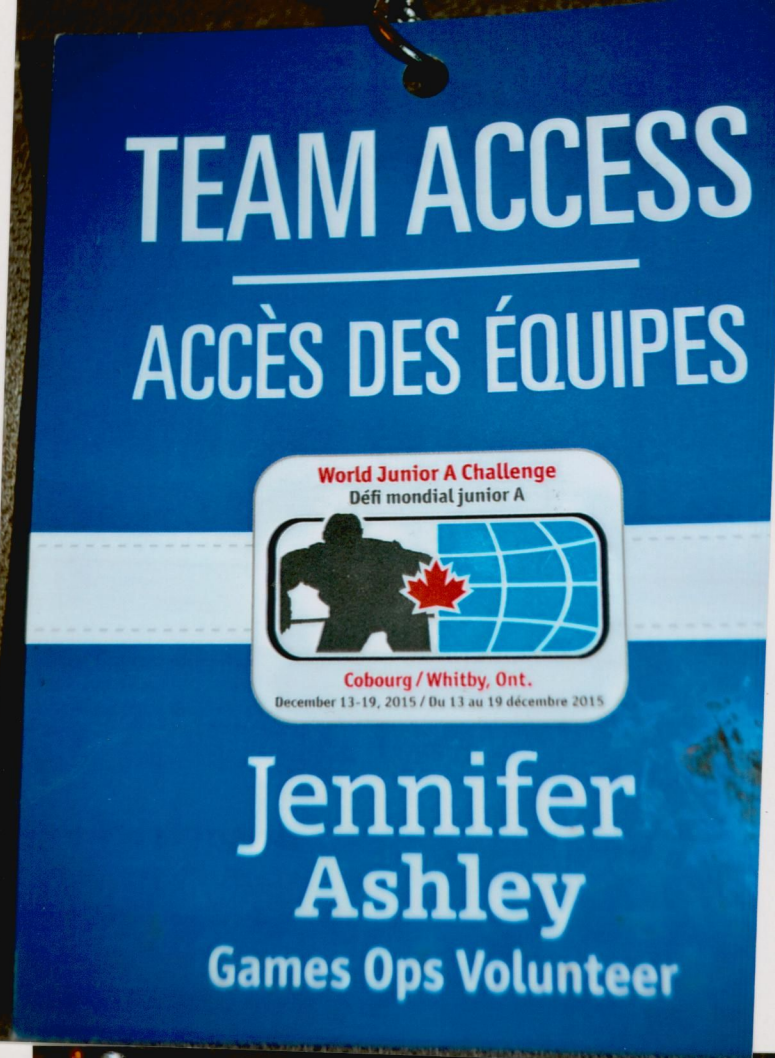

February 22, 1988.

Dear sports editor:

I just cannot believe something that recently occurred in the Mercantile Hockey League. Prior to the playoffs, four players from the Lawn Rangers were told, flat out, by other players on the team that they were not to dress for the playoffs.

I do realize that playoff competition often calls for a more intense "game plan." However, most teams handle the playoff situation in a reasonable and fair manner -- no one is ever TOLD not to dress.

Normally, everyone suits up for the game (I guess that is why they call it a "team" sport). When and if the play becomes crucial, some of the weaker players may be asked to "sit." These players very rarely put up a fuss and will often OFFER to sit if the going gets tough.

Weren't all Cobourg hockey leagues, without exception, established to give Cobourg and area residents the opportunity to play hockey? If so, what gives some players the right to decide whether others are to play or not?

I find it very disturbing that grown men could behave in such a selfish and unsportsmanlike manner. When adults value winning over friendship, we're in trouble. I hate to think that these characters will teach their children with respect to sportsmanship and competition.

## Hockey Yeowomen lose big to Lady Blues in OWIAA championship final

The University of Toronto Lady Blues successfully defended their title, with a 5-0 victory over the York Yeowomen in the OWIAA hockey championship Tuesday night at Varsity Arena.

The Yeowomen's gutsy year-long performance, in the final analysis the Blues' superior talent proved decisive.
