Bill is the ultimate "utility" player when it comes to consideration for induction into the Cobourg Sports Hall of Fame. He was a talented player, a coach, an organizer, a fundraiser and a community leader.

Bill's life in sport began in hard ball country near Ivy Ontario. Baseball in the summer, hockey in the winter at the local gravel pits and ponds. Darts and pool to fill in between seasons and of course euchre! He was a good athlete and a keen competitor in any game/sport where a score was kept. Thus the seeds were sown for many a barnburner, and one game one game only anybody in the house!

In 1964 as a young man, he moved from the area to take a job in Cobourg. Here begins the legend. When he first moved to town he couldn't find a team to play on, after taking stock of the sports scene, he found a fastball team in need of a catcher. This just happened to be his position! He played in the town league for a few seasons where he made many friends and lifelong connections to the sport. Through those contacts Bill found the local mercantile hockey league had a team looking for a goalie (that just happened to be his position). He was even recruited to play nets in broomball after playing a few games between the pipes in the local hockey league.

He continued to play town league fastball and mercantile hockey from the mid 1960's until the late 1990's. With any good athlete, local league play often leads to other opportunities. Dart leagues bowling leagues, horseshoe tournaments, golf tournaments in the area often featured Cowboy as the eventual winner.

It was his skill as a fastball catcher that took him around the country. He played for the Oshawa Toney's and won a Senior A men's fastball title (circa 1978). He was a sought after player and was a pick up for Owen Sound and Barrie ISC teams as well as Trenton and Peterborough Senior teams. It was the Cold Springs Cats teams of the 80s and Masters Version of the 90's that were his greatest achievements. The 1980 Cold Springs Cats were seeded 19 of 20 men's fastball teams at the Senior A Ontario Championships. They worked their way through the tournament and won the championship. This required the team to head to Saskatchewan for the Canadian Finals. The team played to a 4th place finish. Bill holds the record for most put outs in one day at this National Championship event. For this, and his energetic excellent performance, he received a standing ovation at the park.

The Masters version of the Cold Springs Cats won three consecutive Canadian Men's Masters Fastball titles in 1995, 96 and 97.

If you knew Bill, you could hear him at the ball park before you could see him. He was relentlessly positive, motivating his team to "pick it up a notch". Never a bad word to say to the other team (umpires maybe not so much), always chirping good things to his teammates... His energy could lift a team almost singlehanded to a victory... (and a good pitcher made a little better by a big hearted, sure handed, full throated catcher).

However, you would have equally and more importantly noticed his large presence. He was a BIG hearted fellow who would make you feel as though you are the most important person in the world. This BIG personality and huge sense of humour create a natural magnetism. People just wanted to be work with and be involved in events with him. (He was a high draft pick!) There was no one on the planet who could sell 50-50 tickets like him.

As community leader and fundraiser he used his skills to benefit others. He coached Legion baseball and helped with fundraising initiatives. He raised thousands of dollars for hockey teams, baseball teams, community causes and those who may have fallen on hard times. Where ever there was a need, Bill was there to chip in with help, selling tickets or buying/playing in so many euchre, golf and community tournaments, it's a wonder he had time for anything else. He never waited for someone else to do something... he saw a need, and let his big heart be the initiative for helping others.

Bill was awarded Cobourg Citizen of the Year in 2021. An award well deserved given to a man who had given so much to the community at large. Such an honour as helping others just came naturally to him.

He had a genuine love of sport, believing there is a role for everyone in sports experiences; the more the merrier! This might include being a player, a coach, a referee or supporter. He was a hard guy to say no to, with that big booming voice. (He recruited many volunteers using that as disarming advantage!)

A great leader/builder is one who has a BIG vision, who can put people in positions to be successful and support them in those challenges. It is a rare to find a guy who was able to achieve success on so many levels but was mostly driven by helping others to reach those heights. Cowboy was one of a kind.

Thank you for your consideration of Bill Elliott for Induction in the Cobourg Sports Hall of Fame.





Bill "Cowboy" Elliott arrived in Cobourg in the Spring of 1966 at the age of 20. Over the next 50 years, Bill was a huge contributor to the Cobourg Sports Community. He was an elite athlete in his role as Back Catcher for the Cold Springs Cats and several other teams. He was also an exceptional goaltender in hockey, and was a competitive golfer, dart player and bowler.

Bill's proudest accomplishments in sports, however, were in the opportunities he found to give back to the Organizations he loved. 





Sandman on the rubber. Frank Schram singled to trigger the uprising, Mike McIvor worked a walk and Rob Hook rapped a hard single through Kernaghan to put Elliott's on the board.

On the throw-in, Kernaghan cut the ball off and whistled it to second base in an attempt to nail Hook. However, the throw was low and bounced into centre field, enabling both McIvor and Hook to roar home. Suddenly, Elliott's were within a run and the crowd was abuzz.

The die was cast in the seventh when, with Bill Elliott and Schram aboard via back-to-back singles, Mike McIvor's routine hoist to left somehow was missed by Sioux City's Mark Sorenson. allowing the tying and decisive runs to score.

That mishap stood up as the back-breaker in the rare nineinning exhibition. The storybook ending would have had Kernaghan jerking the ball out of the park in the final frame to knot the game 5-5. Alas, big No. 39, who was probably trying too hard to produce throughout, grounded out instead to go 0 for 5 on the night.

Meanwhile, Brian Condon toiled two scoreless innings, leaving it up to Randy Fife, Elliott's fifth hurler of the night, to protect the lead. He did and Elliott's All-Stars had posted an astonishing win.

The pitching stats showed Elliott's quintet permitting eight hits and two walks while striking out seven batters. The variety of flingers meant Penn Corp never faced any pitcher twice. That was a definite factor. Still, Penn Corp's miscues on defence proved fatal.

Elliott's finished with six hits and two walks in the game. Fourteen batters went down on strikes.

Bob Michaelson swatted a single and double for Penn Corp while Burnside and Boys each punched two singles.


For Elliott's, Schram supplied a pair of singles while Allan Burnham and Ruthowsky collected a double apiece.
